# **Course Description**

I enthusiastically welcome ALL of you to the Intro to Global Studies 1b course! The goal of this course is to help students become better global citizens – people who are engaged in building a more sustainable world from **informed and critical perspectives** on current global affairs.

This is a lower-division general education course in Area B2 (Life Sciences without a lab) for students interested in learning more about the evolving nature of our global world. There will be biology content in this course through the lens of a global community. The course focuses on global citizenship as an important way to develop the basic knowledge, skills, tools, and values needed for people to live and work in our hyper-complex interdependent world. We will develop scientific interdisciplinarity frameworks for understanding complex global processes -connecting biological principles governing and sustaining all life in our planet to global-scale resource distribution/use and the social responses emerging from it-.

This course examines the nature and impact of globalization through an introductory exploration of significant global challenges that are shaping human progress on a finite planet with diminishing room and resources. We will investigate human-environment relationship in the context of value systems, economic structures, political institutions, developing policies, and environmental justice movements.

- 4. Analyze the principal characteristics of global citizenship and its role in helping humanity build a better world.

- 1. An information literate student determines the nature and extent of the information needed. The information literate student defines and articulates the need for information, as well as identifies a variety of types and formats of potential sources for information.
- 2. An information literate student evaluates information and its sources critically and incorporates selected information into his/her knowledge base. Students summarize the main ideas to be extracted from the information gathered,

- articulates and applies criteria for evaluating both the information and its sources, and synthesizes main ideas to construct new concepts.
- The information literate student understands the economic, legal, and social issues surrounding the use of information, and accesses and uses information ethically and legally.

Because the course content is focused on global interconnections, early concepts will be revisited in following Modules as the class progresses. #### **Attendance**

Attendance is mandatory in this course and will also count towards your final grade. One hundred percent will be the total number of lectures minus one. This accounts for emergencies and eventualities you might have. Please use it responsibly.

## **Student Responsibilities**

Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally three hours per unit per week) for instruction, preparation/studying, or course related activities, including but not limited to internships, labs, and clinical practica. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus.

# **Assignments**

There will be varying types of assessments and activities throughout the course. These assignments are designed to aid in your understanding of the course material, as well as develop skills in evaluating, analyzing, and communicating information about major global challenges and about being a good global citizen.

Assignments will include low stakes short quizzes, written work, in-person activities. **You** must be present, prepared, and actively participate to receive participation points for activities; there are no makeup points for missed activities. Late work is not accepted.

## **Formatting for Written Work**

Please note that all assignments need to be formatted as follows: 12 point font, Times New Roman, 1 inch margins, doubled spaced, include a header with name and date, and use Turabian/Chicago, MLA, or APA author-year citation style where applicable. There will be a points deduction for not following these guidelines.

#### **Exams**

One take home bio exam and one midterm will be given to test your understanding of the material presented. The exams will be cumulative, and may consist of multiple choice, true-false, matching, and short answer questions. Please do not miss the exam as you will not have the opportunity to make it up. Make-up exams may be considered for legitimate and documented circumstances (medical emergency, death in the family, etc).

Your grade will be based on your assessments, assignments, class participation, and exams. All assignments will be turned in during class time or through Canvas (when specified) before the due date and time. Final grades will not be curved.
