**Course Overview and Description**

In this course you will develop advanced research and writing skills. We will focus on the drafting of a research question, the gathering and categorizing of support data, development of a clear and concise argument, document organization, and proper formatting. You learn to be a good writer by writing, reading, and practicing. We will work on each of these areas in the context of both technical and general audiences.

**Course Goals**

In written communication II courses, students will develop advanced proficiency in college-level writing and appropriate contemporary research strategies and methodologies to communicate effectively to both specialized and general audiences.

- Other: Discipline Specific Writing Standards (Assignment 2)
- Other: Issues of Diversity (Student-specific topics for Assignments 1 and 4 may be pursued)
