Course Format

This state politics undergraduate course will use a lecture, reading, writing, and class participation format.

Course Description

This state politics course is intended to provide students with a general understanding of California state government and politics. Students will study the three branches of state government, their relationship to the federal and local governments, major state government processes (budget, law making, oversight), and the political environment in which that all takes place.

Learning Outcomes

- LO 1: Students will complete this course, having the ability to distinguish powers and responsibilities of the three branches of state government;
- LO 2: Students will complete this course, having a working understanding of the California budget process;
- LO 3: Students will complete this course, having a working understanding of the relationships between state government in California, and the federal government as well as local governments;
- LO 4: Students will complete this course, having an understanding of the two major political belief systems at work in state government.

Program Learning Outcomes

Breadth

Students should possess a broad knowledge of the theory and methods of the various branches of the discipline.

Application and Disciplinary Methods

Students should be able to formulate research questions, engage in systematic literature searches using primary and secondary sources, evaluate research studies, and critically analyze and interpret influential political texts. Students should be able to apply these techniques to identify, understand, and analyze domestic and international political issues and organizations.

Communication Skills

Students should master basic competencies in oral and written communication skills and be able to apply these skills in the context of political science. This means communicating effectively about politics and/or public administration, public policy, and law.

Citizenship

Students should acquire an understanding of the role of the citizen in local, state, national, and global contexts and appreciate the importance of lifelong participation in political processes.

Course Requirements and Assignments

Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally three hours per unit per week) for instruction, preparation/studying, or course related activities, including but not limited to internships, labs, and clinical practica. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus.

Reading assignments will assist students in preparation for class lectures. Such assignments will be given in class one week prior to associated lectures.

Written assignments will be based on reading and lectures, and represent an opportunity for students to demonstrate their grasp and understanding of the subject matter.

A significant portion of a student's grade will be based on a several- week exercise called "simulation". Students will prepare a "role model" paper, conduct small group work, and participate fully in a simulated legislative hearing at the end of the instructional semester.

Final Examination or Evaluation

SJSU policy requires that faculty members "have a culminating activity for their courses, which can include a final examination, a final research paper or project, a final creative work or performance, a final portfolio of

work, or other appropriate assignment." In this course, the final examination will be in memorandum format, based on a hypothetical state government situation to which the student will respond.

Grading Information

Grading will be based on four elements:

- 1. Written Assignments. This component will be valued at 25% of grade, excluding mid-term and final examination.
- 2. Mid-Term Examination. This component will be valued at 25% of grade, and will be in memorandum format in response to a hypothetical situation presented in the context of state government.
- 3. Final Examination. This is valued at 25% of grade, and will be in memorandum format in response to a hypothetical state government challenge.
- 4. In-Class Participation. This is valued at 25% of grade, and is based on in-class participation by individual students.
