Course Description

Integrative survey of current issues in psychology, how they developed and likely future directions. Completion of the research methods requirement prior in enrollment in this course is recommended.

Course Goal

The goal of this course is to provide you with the knowledge and practice to be able to think, interpret, and strategize about basketball in a more advanced way than the average person would.

- CLO5 Describe how concepts of social psychology relate to basketball.

- CLO8 Conduct a presentation explaining the fit of a coach & starting lineup of basketball players.

Classroom Protocol

Class lectures will not be broadcast or recorded on Zoom, as it is university policy (F69-24; <u>http://</u><u>www.sjsu.edu/senate/docs/F69-24.pdf</u>) that students should attend all meetings of their classes. (<u>Note: there are no points/grades associated with class attendance or participation.</u>) Arrive to class on time. Arriving late disrupts other students and interferes with the continuity of the lectures and class activities. If you cannot avoid being late, please enter the class through the least noticeable door and quietly take a seat. Do not start a conversation to catch up on information you missed. Leaving early is equally disruptive. However, if you must, please leave through the least noticeable door. If you miss a class, you are responsible for contacting your instructor to inquire about the information you missed from that class. Your attention is expected during class. Basketball Knowledge Quizzes & Self-test (covers CLO 1)

There will be two quizzes, pre- and post-, as well as a self-test assignment preceding the post-quiz, worth a total of 40 points. Both quizzes will include only multiple-choice questions and be taken through the Canvas Quizzes link. The self-test will be submitted as a PDF to the Canvas *Assignments* link. Each quiz will be reviewed during class time a few days after it was due to be completed. There is no comprehensive midterm or final.

Students are responsible for ensuring that they have access to reliable Wi-Fi during quizzes. If you will not have reliable Wi-Fi for a quiz, inform the instructor at least one week before the quiz date in order for an alternative plan to be made. Make-up Quizzes

It is very important to stay up-to-date on the quiz due dates by following the schedule below. Each quiz will remain open for 24 hours past the due date, but if you complete a quiz during that time period then 10% will be deducted from your quiz point total. If you have a legitimate reason for missing a quiz and need to take it the day after it was due, you are permitted to make-up the quiz on that day without the 10% off penalty *only if* you email me as soon as you can to alert me that you will miss the quiz due date. You will need to let me know your reason for missing the quiz. A make-up quiz must be completed before the review for that quiz. Also, if you know ahead of time that you will have to miss a quiz due date, contact me well before the quiz is scheduled to open so we can figure out the best time for you to make up that quiz.

Participation Assignments (covers CLOs 2/3/4/5/6)

You will complete nine assignments related to our lecture-discussions, worth a total of 80 points. These include three brief assignments worth 2-3 points each (e.g., creating a goal for our course), four analysis assignments worth 12 points each (e.g., quantitative & qualitative analysis of a player), and two application assignments worth 12 points each (e.g., designing an experiment examining a cognitive bias that basketball fans display).

Cumulative Knowledge (CK) Assignments (covers CLOs 2/7/8)

There are two sets of CK assignments: 1) you will write interview questions and interview a player or coach from either the SJSU Men's or Women's basketball teams and 2) you will present an explanation of the fit of a coach and starting lineup of basketball players of your choosing. These assignments will be discussed in detail in class and via posted announcements on Canvas. There are five CK assignments that are worth a total of 80 points: 1) your **Interview Plan & Questions Draft (15 points)**, 2) your **Interview Summary (15 points)**, 3) your **Presentation Slides Draft (10 points)**, 4) your **Final Slides & Presentation (30 points)**, and 5) your **Peer evaluations (10 points)**. You will submit the CK assignments as PDFs uploads to the Canvas *Assignments* link, except for the peer evaluations, which will be submitted in-person during each round of presentations. I will provide you with feedback on all of these assignments except for the peer evaluations. Late Submission Policy

It is very important to stay up-to-date on the Participation and CK Knowledge Assignment due dates by following the schedule below. For each day an assignment is submitted past the due date, 10% will be deducted from your grade. If you fail to turn in your Interview Plan & Questions Draft and/or a Presentation Slides Draft within the parameters outlined in the "CK Assignments" and the "Late Submission Policy" sections of this syllabus, you will receive a zero, but still must complete the assignment in order to be eligible to turn in your Interview Summary and/or Final Slides & Presentation.

Assignment Make-up Policy

If you have a legitimate reason for missing an assignment due date, you may be permitted to make up that assignment without the late submission penalty. However, you will need to contact me as early as you can to let me know your reason for missing the assignment, especially if you know you'll need an extension ahead of the due date. Then we can figure out your timeline for making up the assignment. If you miss the assignment due to an unanticipated reason, please contact me within the first 24 hours after the assignment was due.

Artificial Intelligence (AI) Policy

This policy covers any generative AI tool (e.g., ChatGtP, Elicit, etc.) used to produce text, artwork, graphics, video or audio. You are NOT allowed to use AI tools for your assignments or extra credit opportunities UNLESS given direct permission from your instructor to do so. You may use AI tools to help generate ideas, but note that the material generated by these programs may be inaccurate, incomplete, or otherwise problematic. Please contact your instructor if you are unsure or have questions BEFORE using AI for any assignment. If AI is permitted to be used, you must indicate what part of the assignment was written by AI and what was written by you. No more than 20% of an assignment should be created with AI if the instructor gives permission for its use. Any AI tool use without the permission of the instructors will be counted as plagiarism. Beware that AI tool use may stifle your independent thinking and creativity. *AI policy was revised from policies by Sandy Fyfe and Holly Fernandez-Lynch*.

Extra Credit Opportunities

A total of ten extra credit points may be added to your final point total if you take advantage of the following opportunities. Ten points is a substantial amount (i.e., 5% of your final grade), *but the points must be earned and are being made available to encourage effective time management, applying your new basketball knowledge, and pride in the SJSU's Men's & Women's basketball programs.*

The first opportunity will be to earn four points for submitting the Cumulative Knowledge (CK) assignments early (*excluding the Peer Evaluations for the presentations*). Specifically, you must submit each CK assignment two days early. For example, your **Interview Plan & Questions Draft** is due by 11:59pm on Sunday (10/13), so you must turn it in before 11:59pm on Friday (10/11) for it to count as two days early. You can only earn the full four points by submitting the **Interview Plan & Questions Draft**, **Interview Summary**, **Presentation Slides Draft**, and **Final Slides & Presentation** early (i.e., you earn 1 point for each CK assignment submitted early). These points are tiered if you do not complete all 4 CK assignments early (i.e., if you submit 3/4 CK assignments early, you receive 3 extra credit points, etc.). *This opportunity is meant to encourage you to complete CK assignments early rather than procrastinate in completing your CK assignments*.

The other opportunities are to earn three points for attending (in-person) one SJSU *men's* basketball game and completing a brief player analysis and three points for attending (in-person) one SJSU *women's* basketball game and completing a brief player analysis. These 6 points are tiered if you do not attend both men's and women's games and complete a player analysis (i.e., if you only attend only one game and complete a player analysis you only earn 3 points). *This opportunity is meant to encourage you to apply your advanced basketball knowledge as you support SJSU's basketball programs.*

Grading Policy

Your grade will be based on the total amount of points (200 possible points) you receive from quizzes & selftest (40 possible points), Participation assignments (80 possible points), and CK assignments (80 possible points). Below is a breakdown of the amount of points needed to earn the specified letter grades. (*NOTE*: Individual quiz and assignment totals may change over the course of the semester causing a change in the total amount of points.) All students have the right, within a reasonable time, to know their academic scores, to review their grade-dependent work, and to be provided with explanations for the determination of their course grades.
